

EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION:

The Best Solution for Louisiana's Economy and Children


By appropriating \$94 million of state funds to early care and education programs, the Louisiana Legislature will:

- 1. Prepare our youngest children for a smart start in life;
- 2. Enable families to be productive in the workforce, and;
- 3. Serve as an economic engine for communities across Louisiana.

\$94M will give thousands of parents the support they need to be productive members of the workforce while choosing the high-quality early care and education programs that work best for their children.

Access to high-quality, reliable child care helps **parents work today** and **prepares children for tomorrow. Children only get one chance at childhood** and one chance at learning the fundamentals—how to count, how to talk, how to process.

More in-need children from birth-to-three will be served, however a large gap still remains





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
\$94M will strengthen Louisiana's economy, which loses \$1.3 billion a year due to the impacts of child care breakdowns on working parents.

Child care instability costs Louisiana businesses \$762 million a year from missed work, turnovers, and other related costs such as paying other workers overtime to make up for lost productivity or hiring replacement workers, temporary workers, or contractors. Without significant investment in high-quality early care and education, Louisiana will experience a collective loss of at least \$12.1 billion in the next decade. Alternately, if we begin investing today, the state will see economic gains of at least \$1.8 billion over the next decade.


\$94M will incentivize local investment in early care and education by using one-time funds to offer communities a dollar-fordollar match on their efforts.

How? When local entities in Louisiana invest local dollars in expanding high-quality early care and education, they are eligible for a dollar-for-dollar match from a state matching fund known as the Early Childhood Education Fund, which as of January 31, 2022, has \$1,084,303. While this state fund has several revenue sources, not all of them generate money, and the need is significant.

Without investment, Louisiana loses \$12.1B vs \$1.8B gain with investment




Breakdown of State General Funds for Early Care and Education

**In 2022, the Louisiana Early Childhood Education Commission recommends an initial investment of \$115 million of state funds to serve in-need children aged birth to three followed by additional increasing investments of that amount every year for 10 years.

• Current federal funding for early care and education totals \$481.6 million
